This information will help you understand your visa.

Changes to your circumstances

Up until the time you arrive in Australia, you are required to tell us about any changes to your circumstances as soon as possible. These changes may affect any answer to questions in your application form including your name, passport, contact details, address or family members. You are required to do this in writing and can use Form 1022 *Notification of changes in circumstances* (Section 104 of the *Migration Act 1958*), which is available at www.border.gov.au/forms/Documents/1022.pdf

Failure to notify the Department of your new circumstances can have serious consequences and your visa may be cancelled.

After you arrive in Australia, it is still important that you tell us about any changes to your circumstances as soon as possible. You are required to do this in writing and can use one of the forms available at www.border.gov.au/Lega/Lega/Form/Immi-FAQs/i-have-lodged-my-visa-application-but-things-have-changed-how-do-i-update-my-application

Australian Working Conditions

Know your workplace rights

Pay rates and workplace conditions are set by Australian law. All people working in Australia, including those from overseas, have rights and protections at work. These cannot be taken away by contracts or agreements.

If you have questions about your pay and conditions while in Australia, you can contact the Fair Work Ombudsman for free information, resources and advice.

Pay

Your minimum pay rate can come from an award, enterprise agreement or other registered agreement, or the national minimum wage. Employees have to be paid the right pay rate for all hours they work including training, team meetings, opening and closing the business and doing a trial shift.

National minimum wage

Certain employees may have different pay entitlements depending on whether they have a reduced work capacity because of disability, if they are under the age of 21 or if they are an apprentice or trainee. You can calculate your correct pay and entitlements using the Pay and Conditions Tool at www.fairwork.gov.au/pay

Character requirements

Entering or remaining in Australia is a privilege. You must obey the law and not have a criminal background.

Your visa may be cancelled for a number of reasons, including if you have a criminal record or behave in a way that is a risk to somebody in the Australian community.

Maintaining a valid visa

Your visa expires on 15 March 2020. Your visa allows you multiple entries to Australia until 15 March 2020.

You will need to leave Australia or make alternative arrangements with the Department before this date or you will become unlawful. If you think you will not be able to depart Australia by the date your visa expires, you should contact the Department as soon as possible.

Checking your visa details

You can check and email your visa details and conditions at any time using the Visa Entitlement Verification Online (VEVO) system. To access VEVO, you can either use the QR Code provided above or visit www.border.gov.au/vevo

You will need to enter the following information:

- Your Visa Grant Number or Transaction Reference Number, and

- Your passport or ImmiCard information.

You can also check and email your visa details through the myVEVO mobile app.

Travelling to and from Australia

You can provide evidence that you have the authority to travel to and enter Australia, and/or remain in Australia by showing your passport or ImmiCard linked to your electronic visa record.

Most countries have specific entry, exit and visa requirements. If you are transiting or exiting through another country, it is your responsibility to check with the relevant government authorities. The Australian Government cannot advise on other countries' requirements.

Visa condition 8501

Your visa has been granted with condition 8501 which means that you must maintain adequate arrangements for health insurance (generally Overseas Student Health Cover) while you are in Australia on this visa. You must not enter Australia before your Overseas Student Health Cover has begun. You must not remain in Australia on this visa after your Overseas Student Health Cover has expired.

Tuberculosis warning for international students



International students are 10 times more likely to develop tuberculosis (TB) than people born in Australia.

If you are from a country in Asia, Africa, the Indian sub-continent, South America or Eastern Europe it's likely you have been exposed to TB and are at a higher risk of being infected and getting sick from TB.

TB is an infectious disease that affects the lungs, other organs and bones. TB can be cured with medication but it can be fatal if left untreated.



Around 14 million people have active TB and about one third of the world's population has a latent or silent TB infection.



Medication to treat TB is free in Australia

Students who are diagnosed with TB while in Australia will not have to pay for medication to treat it. Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) will help cover costs associated with diagnosis.



If diagnosed with TB, students will not be asked to leave Australia

If students get treated for TB, it will not affect the conditions of their student visas as long as they comply with treatment.



TB Symptoms

Seek medical advice and give the doctor this fact sheet if you have any of these symptoms:

- cough or fever for more than 2 weeks
- excessive tiredness
- night sweats
- poor appetite and weight loss
- coughing up blood

However, some people with active TB will have no symptoms.



TB Spread

TB bacteria are spread from person to person through the air. People with active TB disease in their lungs can spread the infection when they cough, sneeze, laugh, speak or sing.

Tuberculosis warning for international students



You can have TB even if:



You have been vaccinated

The TB vaccine (BCG) helps protect young children against severe forms of TB. Even if you were vaccinated you can still get TB.



You have been checked for TB

The Visa Medical Screen includes a chest x-ray to look for active or infectious TB. Many people will have latent or silent TB infection which is not found on a chest x-ray. Latent or silent TB does not cause any symptoms but can progress to active and infectious TB months or years after screening.



You don't know anyone with TB

It is possible that you might have been exposed to TB without knowing it. Some people with TB have no symptoms and may not know they have active TB disease.



Where to get help after arriving in Australia

Talk to your doctor, university health service or local hospital

— keep this fact sheet to give to your doctor if you have any symptoms of TB.
